THE REGENT OF GRESIK,

Considering: a. that in accordance with the provisions of Article 37 of Government Regulation Number 43 of 2014 concerning the Implementation Regulation of Law Number 6 of 2014 concerning Villages, as amended by Government Regulation Number 47 of 2015 concerning Amendment to Government Regulation Number 43 of 2014 concerning the Implementation Regulation of Law Number 6 of 2014 concerning Villages, and Article 18 of the Regulation of the Minister of Villages, Development of Disadvantaged Regions, and Transmigration Number 1 of 2015 concerning Guidelines for Authority Based on Original Rights and Village-Scale Local Authority, it is necessary to regulate Guidelines for the Regulation of Village Authority Based on Original Rights and Village-Scale Local Authority;

b. that based on the considerations as referred to in letter a, it is necessary to issue a Regent Regulation concerning Guidelines for the Regulation of Village Authority Based on Original Rights and Village-Scale Local Authority in the Regency of Gresik;

Decides:

To enact: A REGENT REGULATION ON GUIDELINES FOR THE REGULATION OF VILLAGE AUTHORITY BASED ON ORIGINAL RIGHTS AND VILLAGE-SCALE LOCAL AUTHORITY IN THE REGENCY OF GRESIK.

CHAPTER I

GENERAL PROVISIONS

Article 1

In this Regent Regulation:

1. Region means the Regency of Gresik.
2. Central Government hereinafter referred to as the Government means the President of the Republic of Indonesia who holds the power of government of the Republic of Indonesia as referred to in the 1945 Constitution of the Republic of Indonesia.
3. Regional Government means the Regency Government of Gresik and the Regional House of Representatives of the Regency of Gresik.
4. Regional Government means the Regency Government of Gresik.
5. Regent means the Regent of Gresik.
6. Sub-district means the Sub-district located in the Regency of Gresik.
7. Village means the Village located in the Regency of Gresik.
8. Village Government means the administration of government affairs and local community interests within the unitary state system of the Republic of Indonesia.
9. Village Government means the Village Head assisted by Village officials as elements of the Village Government administration.
10. Village Deliberation Body or hereinafter abbreviated as BPD means the institution that carries out government functions whose members are representatives of the Village population based on regional representation and are appointed democratically.
11. Village Community Institution means an institution formed by the community according to needs and is a partner of the village government in empowering the village community.

12. Village Deliberation means a deliberation between the Village Deliberation Body, the Village Government, and community elements organized by the Village Deliberation Body to agree on strategic matters.
13. Village Regulation means legislation enacted by the Village Head after being discussed and agreed upon jointly with the Village Deliberation Body.
14. Village Funds means funds sourced from the State Budget intended for Villages transferred through the budget and used to finance the administration, implementation of development, community development, and community empowerment.
15. Village Fund Allocation hereinafter abbreviated as VFA means the equalization funds received by the regency in the Regional Budget after deducting Special Allocation Funds.
16. Village Budget hereinafter referred to as Village APB is the annual financial plan of the Village Government.
17. Village Development means efforts to improve the quality of life and livelihoods for the greatest welfare of the Village community.
18. Medium-Term Village Development Plan hereinafter abbreviated as RPJM Village means the Village Development Activity Plan for a period of 6 (six) years.
19. Village Government Work Plan, hereinafter abbreviated as RKP Village, is a elaboration of the RPJM Village for a period of 1 (one) year.
20. Village Finances means all rights and obligations of the Village that can be valued in money and anything in the form of money and goods related to the implementation of the Villages rights and obligations.
21. Village Assets means Village-owned goods originating from the Villages original wealth, purchased or obtained at the expense of the Village Budget or other legitimate acquisitions.
22. Village Authority means the authority possessed by the Village, including authority in the field of Village Government administration, Village Development implementation, Village Community Development, and Village Community Empowerment based on community initiatives, original rights and Village customs.
23. Authority based on original rights means rights that are a living legacy and initiatives of the Village or Village community in accordance with the development of community life.
24. Village-scale local authority means the authority to regulate and manage the interests of the

Village community that has been carried out by the Village or is capable and effective to be carried out by the Village or which arises due to Village development and Village community initiatives.

CHAPTER II

PURPOSE AND OBJECTIVES

Article 2

(1) The purpose of compiling this Regent Regulation is to provide guidelines for the Village Government in regulating its authority.

(2) The objective of compiling this Regent Regulation is that the Village Government in regulating its authority is carried out in accordance with applicable legislation.

CHAPTER III

VILLAGE AUTHORITY

Article 3

Village authority includes:

- a. authority based on original rights;
- b. village-scale local authority;
- c. authority assigned by the Government, Provincial Regional Government, or Regency Regional Government; and
- d. other authority assigned by the Government, Provincial Regional Government, or Regency Regional Government in accordance with the provisions of legislation.

Paragraph 1

Authority Based on Original Rights

Article 4

(1) The scope of authority as referred to in Article 3 letter a includes:

- a. the system of village official organization;
- b. community institutional development;
- c. management of Village land or other names;
- d. development of the role of the Village community.

(2) Village Land is land owned by the village originating from bengkok/ganjaran/percatoan land, titisoro, pangonan, sengkeran, guron, cawisan and similar village-owned land controlled and is village wealth.

Paragraph 2

Village-Scale Local Authority

Article 5

The criteria for village-scale local authority include:

- a. authority that prioritizes community service and empowerment activities;
- b. authority that has a scope of regulation and activities only within the Village area and community that has an internal Village impact;
- c. authority related to the daily needs and interests of the Village community;
- d. programs that have been implemented by the Village based on Village initiatives;
- e. programs of the Government, Provincial Government, and Regency Government and third parties that have been handed over and managed by the Village; and
- f. village-scale local authority that has been regulated in legislation concerning the division of authority of the Government, Provincial Government, and Regency Government.

Article 6

Village-scale local authority includes:

- a. the field of Village government administration;
- b. the field of Village development implementation;
- c. the field of Village community development; and
- d. the field of Village community empowerment.

Article 7

The detailed list of authority based on Village original rights and village-scale local authority is attached and is an inseparable part of this Regent Regulation.

Article 8

The types of authority in each field as referred to in Article 3 letter c and letter d are in accordance with the provisions of applicable legislation.

CHAPTER IV

STAGES AND PROCEDURES FOR THE DETERMINATION OF VILLAGE AUTHORITY

Article 9

To determine village authority based on village original rights and village-scale local authority, it is carried out through the following stages:

- a. Selection of authority based on the list that has been determined in the Regent Regulation;
- b. Preparation of a draft Village Regulation concerning the Determination of Village Authority;
- c. Discussion of Village Deliberation; and
- d. Enactment of Village Regulations.

Article 10

(1) The selection of village authority is carried out in the Village Deliberation forum.

(2) The Village deliberation forum is held by the BPD.

(3) The community elements as referred to in section (1) consist of:

- a. traditional leaders;
- b. religious leaders;
- c. community leaders;
- d. education leaders;
- e. representatives of farmer groups;

- f. representatives of fishermen groups;
- g. representatives of craftsman groups;
- h. representatives of womens groups;
- i. representatives of child care and protection groups; and
- j. representatives of poor community groups.

(4) In addition to the community elements as referred to in section (2), the Village Deliberation may involve other community elements in accordance with the socio-cultural conditions of the community.

(5) The selection of village authority is based on the List of Village Authority that has been determined by the Regent.

(6) The results of the deliberation as referred to in section (1) are recorded in the Minutes.

Article 11

(1) The Village Head together with the BPD may add other types of authority based on original rights and village-scale local authority in accordance with community initiatives, needs and local Village conditions.

(2) The results of the addition of types of authority as referred to in section (1) are recorded in the Minutes and are an inseparable part of the Minutes as referred to in Article 10 section (6).

Article 12

The Village Government prepares a Draft Village Regulation concerning Village Authority based on the Minutes as referred to in Article 10.

Article 13

The Draft Village Regulation as referred to in Article 12 is consulted with the local Sub-district Head.

Article 14

Based on the results of the consultation as referred to in Article 13, the Village Head submits the Draft Village Regulation concerning Village Authority to the BPD to be discussed and agreed upon jointly.

Article 15

(1) Authority based on original rights and village-scale local authority is determined by Village Regulation after obtaining joint agreement with the BPD.

(2) The Village Regulation as referred to in section (1) forms the basis for Village policies, programs, and activities in the field of Village Government administration, Village Development implementation, Village Community Development, and Village Community Empowerment.

(3) The Village Regulation as referred to in section (1) is reported to the Regent and socialized to the community.

Article 16

(1) The determination of Village Authority can be reviewed and adjusted to the Village potential, facilities and infrastructure.

(2) For villages that have not yet determined their authority, the Regent prepares a Circular Letter regarding Guidelines for the Implementation of Village Government Duties.

CHAPTER VI

FINAL PROVISIONS

Article 17

This Regent Regulation shall come into force on the date of its promulgation.

In order that everyone may be aware of it, order the promulgation of this Regent Regulation by placing it in the Gresik Regency Regional Gazette.

LIST OF VILLAGE AUTHORITY BASED ON ORIGINAL RIGHTS AND VILLAGE-SCALE LOCAL
AUTHORITY

A. AUTHORITY BASED ON ORIGINAL RIGHTS

1. Government Administration Field, includes:

- a. Arrangement of the village official organizational system;
- b. Appointment of grave keepers, harbor keepers, village hall keepers;
- c. Management of Village land, originating from:
 - 1) Bengkok, Ganjaran or percaton, namely village land which is income for the village head, village secretary, head of affairs, and hamlet head;
 - 2) Titisoro, namely village land whose proceeds are deposited in the village treasury and used, among other things, to help people affected by disasters, the destitute, the poor, to establish schools, places of worship, and the like;
 - 3) Pangonan, namely land managed by the village and used to graze the livestock of the villagers concerned so that their livestock do not damage other peoples gardens or roam on the road;
 - 4) Sengkeran, namely village land whose proceeds are deposited in the village treasury and used, among other things, for village cleaning, maintenance of punden (the tomb of the village founders) and for other ritual ceremonies;
 - 5) Guron, is village land whose proceeds are deposited in the village treasury and used as income for teachers who have not been appointed as civil servants serving in the Village;
 - 6) Cawisan, namely land whose proceeds are deposited in the village treasury and is the village heads tactical funds used for incidental needs;
 - 7) Other similar lands that are controlled and are village wealth.
- d. Facilitation of land rights registration in the village;
- e. Facilitation of village-level land dispute resolution;
- f. Arrangement and mapping of Land Use; and
- g. Other activities according to the needs and conditions of the village.

2. Implementation of Development Field, includes:

- a. Preservation of the gotong-royong culture: gugur-gunung, kerigan, communal work, sambatan, social service and/or other names;
- b. Restoration of ancestral tombs;
- c. Other activities according to the needs and conditions of the village.

3. Community Development Field, includes:

- a. Development of the village community organizational system: Development of community associations, lineage/descendants, development of rembug warga;
- b. Development of customary institutions in the village;
- c. Development of the preservation of traditional art groups;
- d. Other activities according to the needs and conditions of the local village.

4. Community Empowerment Field, includes:

- a. Preservation of customs in the village, such as sedekah bumi, sedekah laut, muludan, rajaban, likuran, syuran, sya?banan, tilikan (grave visitation), and selamatan weton;
- b. Preservation of culture: kuda lumping, sholawatan, jamjaneng, wayang;
- c. Thanksgiving after harvest, Rebo wekasan, Okol, and/or Jaran kepang;
- d. Other activities according to the needs and conditions of the village.

B. VILLAGE-SCALE LOCAL AUTHORITY

1. Village-scale local authority in the field of Village government includes:

- a. Determination and confirmation of Village boundaries;
- b. Development of Village administration and information systems;
- c. Development of Village spatial planning and social maps;
- d. Data collection and classification of Village workers;
- e. Data collection of the population working in the agricultural and non-agricultural sectors;
- f. Population data according to the number of working-age population, labor force, job seekers, and labor force participation rate;
- g. Data collection of people aged 15 years and over who work according to the type of work, type of work, and employment status;
- h. Data collection of people working abroad;
- i. Determination of the Village Government organization;
- j. Formation of the Village Deliberation Body;
- k. Determination of Village officials;

- I. Determination of Village-Owned Enterprises (BUM Desa);
- m. Determination of Village APB;
- n. Determination of Village Regulations;
- o. Determination of inter-Village cooperation;
- p. Granting permits for the use of village-owned meeting halls and/or village halls;
- q. Data collection of Village potential;
- r. Granting permits for the right to manage Village land;
- s. Proposal for the determination of a Village in a state of emergency, such as disasters, conflicts, food insecurity, disease outbreaks, security disturbances, and other extraordinary events on a Village scale;
- t. Management of Village archives; and
 - u. Determination of security posts and other preparedness posts owned by the village in accordance with the needs and social conditions of the Village community.
- v. Holding Village Head Elections;
- w. Formation of Village Government organizations;
- x. Appointment and Dismissal of Village Officials;
- y. Improvement of the capacity of village officials;
- z. Formation of BPD filling;
- aa. Determination of Regulations in the Village;
- bb. Management of Village Finances;
- cc. Management of Village Levies;
- dd. Management of Village Assets;
- ee. Administration and Village Archives;
- ff. Inter-village and/or third-party cooperation;
- gg. Management of village information systems;
- hh. Giving Recommendations;
- ii. Development of Village industrial outputs;
- jj. Village population data collection;
- kk. Procurement of village security facilities and infrastructure (Pos kamling, etc.);
- II. Maintaining peace and order in the village;

- mm. Early warning monitoring of the occurrence of extraordinary events;
- nn. Financing of linmas operations;
- oo. Management of village-scale disaster data and information;
- pp. Socialization of various village-level regulations;
- qq. Development of Community Communication Institutions (LKM);
- rr. Development of village and inter-village information and communication networks;
- ss. Compilation of village profiles;

2. Village-scale local authority in the field of Village development includes:

- a. Basic Village services;
 - 1) development of Village health clinics and Polindes;
 - 2) development of Village health workers;
 - 3) management and development of Posyandu through:
 - a) nutritional services for toddlers;
 - b) pregnant womens examinations;
 - c) provision of additional food;
 - d) health counseling;
 - e) clean and healthy living movement;
 - f) baby weighing; and
 - g) healthy movement for the elderly.
 - 4) development of school environmental health efforts;
 - 5) monitoring and prevention of drug and addictive substance abuse in the Village;
 - 6) Simple counseling on infectious and non-infectious diseases;
 - 7) Management of healthy funds;

- 8) Management of family herbal medicine activities (toga);
- 9) Procurement of village-level health facilities;
- 10) Implementation of health promotion efforts;
- 11) Monitoring of drug and addictive substance abuse in the village;
- 12) Facilitation of the Implementation of Siaga Villages;
- 13) Formation and Strengthening of Village AIDS Care Groups;
- 14) Provision of Additional Food and Vitamins;
- 15) development and management of early childhood education;
- 16) procurement and management of learning centers, art and cultural centers, and Village libraries; and
- 17) facilitation of learning groups in the Village;
- 18) Facilitation of the implementation of Early Childhood Education, Non-Formal and Informal Education (PAUDNI);
- 19) Facilitation of Community Learning Centers (PKBM);
- 20) Facilitation of Community Reading Gardens (TBM);
- 21) Facilitation of Basic Education in the village;
- 22) Data collection of education in the village;
- 23) Poor Student Assistance;
- 24) Facilitation of the development of arts and culture in the village;
- 25) Monitoring and prevention of violence against women and children.
- 26) Issuing certificates of poverty;
- 27) Facilitation of the processing of abandoned people and people with disabilities;
- 28) Data collection of people with social problems and potential social welfare;
- 29) Facilitation of the provision of social assistance for people with social welfare problems;
- 30) Village-level poverty reduction;
- 31) Determination of Poor People;
- b. Village facilities and infrastructure;
 - 1) construction and maintenance of Village offices and halls;
 - 2) construction and maintenance of Village roads;
 - 3) construction and maintenance of farm access roads;

- 4) construction and maintenance of Village reservoirs;
 - 5) development of new and renewable energy;
 - 6) construction and maintenance of places of worship;
 - 7) management of Village cemeteries and historical sites;
 - 8) construction and maintenance of environmental sanitation;
 - 9) construction and management of clean water on a Village scale;
 - 10) construction and maintenance of tertiary irrigation;
 - 11) construction and maintenance of Village-owned sports facilities and infrastructure;
 - 12) construction and maintenance of Village parks;
 - 13) construction and maintenance of Village gates;
 - 14) construction and maintenance and management of channels for aquaculture; and
 - 15) development of production facilities and infrastructure in the Village.
 - 16) Facilitation of assistance for the renovation of RTM houses;
 - 17) Facilitation of house construction due to disasters;
 - 18) Facilitation of the construction and management of communal bathing, washing, and toilet (MCK) facilities;
 - 19) Facilitation of the construction of RTM MCK;
 - 20) Construction of Village Government Facilities and Infrastructure;
 - 21) Construction and Maintenance of Wastewater and Village Drainage Channels;
 - 22) Village-level disaster mitigation;
- c. Development of the local Village economy;
- 1) construction and management of Village markets and Village kiosks;
 - 2) construction and management of Village-owned fish auctions;
 - 3) development of micro-enterprises based in the Village;
 - 4) empowerment of micro-finance based in the Village;
 - 5) construction and management of floating net cages and Village-owned fish bagans;
 - 6) construction and management of food barns and determination of Village food reserves;
 - 7) determination of superior agricultural and fisheries commodities in the Village;
 - 8) regulation of the integrated implementation of pest and disease control in agriculture and fisheries;

- 9) determination of the type of organic fertilizers and feed for agriculture and fisheries;
- 10) development of local seeds;
- 11) collective livestock development;
- 12) construction and management of independent energy;
- 13) establishment and management of Village-Owned Enterprises (BUM Desa);
- 14) construction and management of boat moorings;
- 15) management of grazing lands;
- 16) development of Village tourism outside the regencys tourism development master plan;
- 17) management of fish seed centers;
- 18) development of appropriate technology for processing agricultural and fisheries products; and
- 19) development of agricultural production business systems based on local resources, institutions and culture.
- 20) Facilitation of the marketing of Micro Small Business products;
- 21) Management of productive economic business groups;
- 22) Facilitation of capital for MSMEs (micro, small and medium enterprises);
- 23) Capacity building of MSME groups;
- 24) Development of Local Farmer Institutions;
- 25) Management of farm-level irrigation networks and village-level irrigation networks;
- 26) Popularization of organic fertilizers;
- 27) Development of food barns;
- 28) Facilitation of farming capital;
- 29) Facilitation/assistance in providing superior seeds/seedlings;
- 30) Management of village forests, except for village forests with special functions;
- 31) Reforestation and soil conservation provided from village seedling gardens;
- 32) Preservation of village seedling gardens;
- 33) Management of village road poles;
- 34) Development of non-timber forest products according to the local potential of the village in community forests/village forests/village tourism forests;
- d. Utilization of natural resources and the Village environment.
 - 1) reforestation;

- 2) terracing;
- 3) mangrove forest maintenance;
- 4) spring protection;
- 5) cleaning of river basins;
- 6) coral reef protection; and
- 7) other activities according to village conditions.
- 8) Supervision of activities and businesses that have an impact on the village environment;
- 9) Regulation, control, preservation of the environment and village land use;
- 10) Management of waste at the village level;
- 11) Facilitation of the formation of Environmental Care Groups in the village;
- 12) Preserving ecosystems and the environment;

3. Village-scale local authority in the field of Village community development includes:

- a. fostering security, order and peace in the Village area and community;
- b. fostering harmony among Village residents;
- c. maintaining peace, handling conflicts and conducting mediation in the Village; and
- d. preserving and developing community gotong royong in the Village.
- e. Implementation of Family Planning Counseling;
- f. Implementation of Family Planning Acceptor Development;
- g. Management of family development groups;
- h. Facilitation of RTM participation in the Family Planning program;
- i. Facilitation of productive skills for low-income families;
- j. Facilitation of family health services for RTM;
- k. Development of village sports facilities and infrastructure;
- l. Improvement of human resources in sports;
- m. Facilitation of the development of village youth organizations and activities;
- n. Holding village-level sports events;

4. Village-scale local authority in the field of community empowerment includes, among others:

- a. development of local arts and culture;

- b. organization through the formation and facilitation of community institutions and customary institutions;
- c. facilitation of community groups through:
 - 1) farmer groups;
 - 2) fishermen groups;
 - 3) art and culture groups; and
 - 4) other community groups in the Village.
- d. provision of social assistance to poor families;
- e. facilitation of vulnerable groups, poor communities, women, children, indigenous peoples, and people with disabilities;
- f. organization through the formation and facilitation of paralegals to provide legal advice to Village residents;
- g. participatory poverty analysis in the Village;
- h. implementation of health promotion and clean and healthy living movement;
- i. organization through the formation and facilitation of development and community empowerment cadres;
- j. capacity building through Village economic enterprise training;
- k. utilization of appropriate technology; and
- l. community capacity building through:
 - 1) Village community empowerment cadres;
 - 2) productive economic business groups;
 - 3) womens groups;
 - 4) farmer groups;
 - 5) poor community groups;
 - 6) fishermen groups;
 - 7) craftsman groups;
 - 8) child care and protection groups;
 - 9) youth groups; and
 - 10) other groups according to Village conditions.
- m. Implementation of Village Development Planning;

- n. Monitoring, evaluation, and control of village development;
- o. Formation and strengthening of community empowerment cadres;
- p. Formation and strengthening of community organizations in the village;
- q. Increased community participation in government policies;
- r. Formation and Facilitation of village child protection groups;
- s. Formation and Facilitation of village childrens forums;
- t. Community empowerment based on gender;
- u. Protection of Gender-Based Violence and Child Victims in the village;
- v. Implementation of gender mainstreaming.
- w. Management of Family Empowerment and Welfare;
- x. Management of village-owned tourist attractions;
- y. Facilitation of tourism actors in the village.
